

Global warming is accelerating








The Paris Agreement



'Pursue efforts' to limit warming to 1.5°C

Limit warming to 'well below' 2°C above pre-industrial levels



Increase ability to adapt to the adverse impacts of climate change and foster climate resilience and low greenhouse gas emissions development


Peak greenhouse gas emissions as soon as possible

Achieve 'net zero' emissions in the second half of this century

Make finance flows consistent with a pathway towards low greenhouse gas emissions and climate-resilient development

Momentum is building in 2021




