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

Farewell to Yann Tristant

Those who were able to attend the first in-person ACE / Rundle Foundation event since the start of the pandemic, held on the 19th June 2021 in the new Arts Precinct at Macquarie University, heard the bitter sweet news that Associate Professor Yann Tristant has been offered a position in Egyptian Archaeology at the KU Louvain in Belgium – bitter, because we are very sad to lose a great colleague and friend, sweet, because the position in Louvain acknowledges Yann's considerable academic achievements and opens up great academic and research possibilities for him, as well as bringing him closer to his family in France. In the 10 years that Yann spent at Macquarie University he made a huge contribution to Egyptology and Archaeology, in both teaching and research. He was instrumental in establishing the Bachelor of Archaeology degree and we regularly enjoyed hearing about his research projects and fieldwork in the Wadi Arabah, Abu Roash and, most recently, Dendera. A hallmark of Yann's teaching was the involvement of students in research, which included the 3D scanning and publication of the Egyptian funerary objects in the Museum of Ancient Cultures (now Macquarie University History Museum), resulting in the publication of the book Death is only the beginning: Egyptian funerary customs at the Macquarie Museum of Ancient Cultures. Yann will be greatly missed. We wish him and his family all the best for the future and look forward to him visiting us and hearing of his future activities. (Boyo Ockinga)

The tomb of Khnumhotep I is located in the southern section of the upper terrace of tombs at Beni Hassan (no.14), between that of Baqet III (no. 15) to its south and another Khnumhotep (no. 13) to its north. It features a large chapel, originally pillared, as well as two burial shafts cut into the native, good-quality white limestone of the cliff.

She recently had a paper published in the prestigious archaeology journal, *Bulletin of the American Schools of Oriental Research* (BASOR), focusing on the well-known tomb of Khnumhotep II at Beni Hassan.

Dr Mourad has a long-standing association with MQ Egyptology, having completed her PhD at the University, and we congratulate her on this major piece of research.
